Charleston Bicycles for Humanity



BACKGROUND

- Bicycles for Humanity (B4H) CHARLESTON is a local chapter of a global grassroots movement, that provides the gift of mobility delivered by a bicycle to many in developing countries in Africa
- In addition to delivering bicycles, many B4H groups work with the local people to develop the skills to manage the bike programs and to ensure that the community realizes maximum value from the gifts of mobility that bicycles provide.
- B4H raises funds, collect bicycles and ship them to community-based organizations in developing countries. Bicycles are delivered in shipping containers that remain in the country and become community bicycle workshops called Bicycle Empowerment Centers.

ISSUES

- A bicycle solves the problem of mobility and helps empower people to change their life.
- The mobility a bicycle provides allows people to travel greater distances in a shorter length of time and transport much more weight.

SERVICE

- Cadets from F-Troop spent two hours each Wednesday afternoon at Porter Gaud Middle School in James Island preparing bicycles for shipment
- We would take off the front wheel and pedals, then zip-tie them flat to the frame of the bicycle. This helps more bikes fit in the limited space of a single shipping container
- This was the first time cadets have worked directly with the Porter Gaud School, located just 2.5 miles from our campus




OUTPUTS

Over 300 bikes have been prepped in just 5 sessions, with only 400 needed to fill a container. Without the cadets the school could only fill one container a year, but with cadets there is a potential to do two or three.

In just 4 sessions we have provided 35 hours of service

The school's high school students apply to The Citadel at relatively low rates although almost all of them attend a 4-year college or university, so working side-by-side with them has given cadets the opportunity to answer their questions about the school and connect it to their passions.

Because this is a company project for F-Troop it has allowed cadets of all four classes to serve together outside of campus and has provided unique opportunities for freshmen to develop working relationships with upperclassmen.
